Problems encountered and resource required:

This practice encountered various problems in the begging of the academic year. Since the college do not have fenced parking, it has become very difficult to run the practice. Sometimes it resulted in small conflicts among the committee members and the staff and students. But the practice hasn't been given up due to these problems. The college needs fenced parking for the effective implementation of the practice.
